Rules for FIG International Age Group Competitions (IAGC)

Valid from 1.1.2005

These Rules are also valid for Age Group Competitions held in conjunction with Continental Championships.

1. Staging of the competition

- 1.1 The FIG International Age Group Competitions must be held in the same year as the World Championships.
- 1.2 The FIG International Age Group Competitions will be staged as a separate competition, and not in conjunction with any other competition.
- 1.3 Federations making an application for the holding of the World Championships may also apply for the FIG International Age Group Competitions.

2. Conditions of entry

- 2.1 Only entries made by affiliated federations of the FIG will be accepted. Any entry not so received must be returned to the sender.
- 2.2 A maximum entry of 80 participating gymnasts per federation is permitted. Maximum 4 (four) gymnasts [2 (two) pairs in synchro] per federation may enter per each age group and event in each discipline. (see §4 and §5)
- 2.3 Gymnasts who have competed in a discipline at a World Championship may not compete in the same year in that discipline at the FIG International Age Group Competitions.

3. Entries

See Technical Regulations.

4. Age groups

- 4.1 11 - 12 years old in the year of competition
- 4.2 13 - 14 years old in the year of competition
- 4.3 15 - 16 years old in the year of competition
- 4.4 17 - 18 years old in the year of competition

5. Events

Individual events in Trampoline, Double Mini-Trampoline, Tumbling and Synchro events in Trampoline:

- 5.1 11-12 year old boys

- 5.2 11-12 year old girls
- 5.3 13-14 year old boys
- 5.4 13-14 year old girls
- 5.5 15-16 year old boys
- 5.6 15-16 year old girls
- 5.7 17-18 year old boys
- 5.8 17-18 year old girls

6. Competition rules

The FIG Code of Points for Trampoline Gymnastics will apply with the following variations:

- 6.1 The starting order for the Qualifying Round will be decided by a draw.
- 6.2 In Trampolining, the Qualifying Round will consist of 1 (one) voluntary routine only (including difficulty).
- 6.3 In Tumbling, §5.1, 5.2, 5.3 and 5.4 of the FIG Code of Points will apply, with the exception that there is only 1 (one) pass in the Final.
- 6.4 No gymnast shall compete in other than his/her age group except in respect of 6.4.1.
 - 6.4.1 In synchronised competition, the age of the older gymnast determines the age group in which the pair must enter.
- 6.5 The gymnasts with the 6 (six) best scores from the Qualifying Round will go forward to the Finals.

Note: during the IAGC in Eindhoven last September, I was asked to clarify a number of "points" in relation to these competitions and if possible include the rules in a future Trampoline News, which I am more than happy to do. It should be noted however, that these rules are current, but may change prior to the 2007 IAGC in Quebec CAN. All will be notified accordingly if this is the case. **Ed.**

Honorary Life Membership Award

As Vice-President of Scottish Gymnastics I had the great pleasure of announcing two Honorary Life Member Awards at this year's AGM. Presentation of the award is in itself an unusual event, but what made this even more unusual was that this year both recipients have come from the sport of Trampoline.

JOHN BEETON

John Beeton from Stonehaven has been involved in the sport of trampoline for over 30 years, commencing his sporting career in 1975. He was originally elected to the post of regional organiser for Lothian & Borders, and was subsequently elected to Vice Chair of the Scottish Trampoline Association in 1978, a post he held until 1984.

In addition to the duties of the above posts, John also held positions as Competition Secretary for 9 years, International Organiser for 20 years and Junior Squad Coach for 4 years.

In 1984 John was elected to the post of Association Secretary, a post he retained until 1993. John's expertise, organising ability and knowledge was recognised in 1980 when he was appointed Chair of the Organising Committee for the European Youth Championships in Edinburgh.

John remained on the Executive Committee of the Scottish Trampoline Association until it transferred into the SGA Trampoline Technical Panel in 2000, where he once again acted as Secretary to the panel until 2004.

With the integration of trampoline into the gymnastics family, John was asked by British Gymnastics to join the National Trampoline Technical Panel where he continues to be responsible for World Class Liaison and International events

On the international scene, John initially gained his International Judge qualification in 1985 and was elected to the FIT in 1986 as Vice President. His interest in the sport continued with his appointment as Chair and founder member of the FIT Medical Commission lasting until 1990. He also established and acted as editor of the FIT Newsletter during the period 1987 – 1998.

Following the merger, John was elected to the FIG Trampoline Committee as Deputy-Secretary in 1999, and the following year as Secretary of the committee, a post he currently retains.

John's knowledge, contribution to the sport and international standing was recognised by the FIT in 1998 being awarded

Honorary Membership at their annual congress. He was further recognised in 2000 by British Gymnastics being awarded Distinguished Judge Award. John has judged in numerous European and World Championships and subsequently in the pinnacle of the sporting calendar, the Olympic Games

John Beeton, Great Britain's only FIG Grade 1 Trampoline judge has committed a lifetime to the sport and the award of Honorary Life membership of Scottish Gymnastics is a worthy recognition by his home country of his contribution to the sport he loves.

JOHN RIDGE

John Ridge, Head Coach at East Kilbride Trampoline Club recently announced his retiral from coaching after 40 years of involvement in his beloved sport of trampolining. Hailing from the Stoke on Trent area, John became involved in trampoline activities around 40 years ago before moving north to Scotland in the early 1970s. He subsequently became involved with East Kilbride Trampoline Club and the Scottish Trampoline Association.

John is recognised throughout Scotland and the rest of Great Britain for his coaching knowledge, expertise and standards. Through his direction and control, East Kilbride has risen to be the most successful Scottish trampoline club of recent times. Competition success at Scottish, British and World level have all been achieved through his club members and in July of this year, one of his club members became British Champion at Under 11.

In addition to his own club, John has always been willing to share his knowledge with coaches and competitors alike and he has shown great understanding in assisting newer coaches and competitors in competition. His coaching expertise has been shared through his organisation of coach education courses and many of his pupils from these courses are now actively running classes and session in the west of Scotland.

As a judge, he has officiated at just about every Scottish domestic competition in the last 20 years where again his experience and knowledge is well recognised by his peers.

John Ridge has been at the forefront of the development of trampoline in Scotland and his contribution to the sport in our country over the last 20 years is incalculable. The award of Honorary Life member of Scottish Gymnastics is therefore one that is richly deserved.

Trampoline North West 'Services to Sport' Award 2005

The 2005 Services to Sport Award was awarded to **Ron Heathcote** at the NorthWest trampoline Championships in November. Ron in partnership with the late Dave Rankin developed trampolining in the NorthWest. They were life members 7 and 8 in the BTF. In the early days (1970's) Ron and Dave ran 2 day proficiency courses 6 or more times a year to give 40 plus people a chance each day to try out trampolining. Their enthusiasm knew no bounds. At the same time Ron was tutoring coaches and running a trampolining repairs business. After trampolines became common in most sports centres they stopped the courses but didn't stop tutoring courses and coaching. They also ran the Coaching courses at the Blackpool Easter School for teachers along with the likes of **Nick Stuart**. Ron's coaching continued at Manchester University where he still coaches. Many of the current competitive clubs in the North West is run by those who came under Ron and Dave's influence - to name a few - **Birkenhead, Aerodynamic, Stockport, City of Salford**.

Many people who never trampolined in their lives may well have come across Ron in his trampoline and diving acts which he did at holiday camps and shows. For those who know him he is renowned for his never-ending fund of hilarious stories. His name goes down in the book of honours of those who have played a major part in developing trampolining in the NorthWest. Long may he continue

Major International coup for GB

Agreement has been made with Gymnastics Canada to visit the United Kingdom in August 2007 with a full team of senior and youth gymnasts in TRA TUM and DMT for an international match with Great Britain.

Additionally, Germany has agreed to participate in the youth trampoline event as part of their bi-annual visit to Great Britain for the annual GBR v GER Youth Match.

The Canadian team are at present; one of the strongest nations in all three disciplines and the event is bound to draw a large audience.
